Understanding best practice in managing volunteers, current legislation and how best to assess the value that your volunteers provide is key to sustainable and productive volunteer / staff teamwork and will ensure successful development for the organisation. This workshop will explore volunteer recruitment and retention, current legislation, assessment techniques and case studies on the do's and don'ts of volunteer management.
